#### Objective

To advance the development of the game of Basketball and enhance the standard thereof.

To assist the Singapore National Olympic Council and Singapore Sports Council or other organisations in the promotion of the game of Basketball.

To promote and arrange basketball competition, for the benefit of affiliated clubs, associations and teams desiring to visit Singapore.

#### Term Limit of Board

All members elected into the Management Committee shall serve a basic term not exceeding two (2) years, commencing from the date of his election to the next AGM at which an election of the Management Committee takes place.

An individual representing an Ordinary Member shall be eligible to stand for election into the Management Committee, except for the office of Honorary Treasurer, for a maximum of four (4) consecutive basic terms. Provided always that such individual shall become eligible to stand for election after a lapse of at least one (1) basic term.

Subject to Rule 7(1), (4) and (5) from Constitution, an individual elected to the office of Honorary Treasurer shall hold office for one (1) basic term and shall be eligible to stand for re-election as Honorary Treasurer for one (1) more consecutive basic term only. Provided always that such individual shall become eligible to stand for election for the post of Honorary Treasurer after a lapse of at least one (1) basic term. Nothing herein shall prevent

such individual for standing for election for another post, except for the office of Honorary Treasurer, in accordance to Rule 7(4) and (5).

The reserves that the Association have set aside provide financial stability and the means for the development of the principal activities. The Association intends to maintain the fund at a level which is at least equivalent to 3 months of operating expenses of approximately \$\$250,000. The funds are meant to provide a cushion to ease the operational cash flow requirements while pending funding from SportSG.

The Management Committee reviews annually the amount of funds that are required to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil the Association's continuing obligations.

The Association is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements.

The building fund was set up for the Association's leasehold improvements. This is amortised according to the useful life of leasehold improvements. During the year, the amortisation of the building fund amounted to \$\$63,830 (2019: \$\$63,830) (Please refer to Financial Statement for year Ended 31 March 2020.



#### President's Statement for AGM, June 2020

Welcome to this year's Basketball Association of Singapore's (BAS) Annual General Meeting 2020.

One year has passed since the current Management Committee (MC) took over in July last year. I would like to put on record my appreciation to the present MC, Ordinary Members, sub-committees, Secretariat staff, as well as the previous term MC who have invested much in their respective areas for the development of basketball.

I would like to also welcome Dr Toh Kian Lam, who joined us in October 2019 as the CEO of BAS. Together with the Secretariat staff, Dr Toh has been working very closely with the various sub-committees on discussing and introducing new initiatives for the growth of the sport. Many of these activities will be further elaborated in the respective sub-committees reports.

I would like to also particularly thank our sporting partner- Sports Singapore for their continuous support. I look forward to greater collaborations between both parties so that BAS can develop basketball as the team sport of choice.

#### **Annual General Meeting 2019**

The previous Annual General Meeting (AGM) was an election year where the MC members were elected for the 2019 – 2021 term and was held on Sunday, 30 June 2019 at the Singapore Basketball Centre. The President post (one seat) and the Vice President posts (four seats) were contested respectively with the 16-member Management Committee hold office effectively for the term from July 2019 to June 2021.

#### **Notable Achievements**

I would like to share several accomplishments BAS has made over the past year-given the numerous challenges- such as the COVID-19 situation. These 'milestones' should encourage us to reflect, and motivate us moving forward as a team.

In September 2019, SAFSA- the national champions represented Singapore in the FIBA Asia Champions Cup- East Asia Qualifiers tournament. BAS had also implemented a Club Licensing System with the aim of enhancing professionalism in all Division 1 clubs and there was also more exposure and focus on the 3x3 basketball with several tournaments being organised.

I am also pleased to share that Honorary Secretary Dr Koh and TC Chairman Mr Ong have been appointed to the FIBA Asia Permanent Committees for the Term of Office 2019-2023. Dr Koh is appointed as a member to the Development Committee (South East) while Mr Ong is appointed to the Youth Committee (South East) respectively. The FIBA Asia Permanent Committee consists of 11 Sub-Committees with representatives from different sub-zones (Asia Region) from different countries in Asia aiming to develop basketball in Asia. Dr Koh is also appointed to the FIBA Technical Commission for the Term of Office 2019-2023, with the

main functions include the development of the sport globally, reviewing the Official Basketball Rules as well as responsible for the training & development of FIBA international officials.

With Dr Koh and Mr Ong's expertise & experiences, I am confident that Singapore will contribute vastly to the development of basketball in Asia.

On the Marketing & Publicity front- M&P Committee, together with BAS had worked hard to grow its revenue streams and ensure NSA sustainability in line with the MYSP, obtaining more than \$350,800 in cash & product-in-kind for the FY. BAS also partners with Genius Sports and 1 Play Sports on live streaming capabilities and game-day interactive to enhance publicity. BAS's digital platforms also continue to grow with BAS Instagram page in particular, recorded a 35% increase in followers.

#### 30<sup>th</sup> SEA Games 2019

The Senior Men's National Team participated in the 30<sup>th</sup> SEA Games and although we did not obtain any podium finish, the team gained many new fans, especially player Lavin Rajwho was a fan favourite during the match against the Philippines. The men's team also attracted lots of media attention with media interviews leading to the Games. BAS, alongside Coaching & Development Committee, will work closely on the High Performance Competition Plan in preparation for SEA Games 2021.

#### **Major Domestic Tournaments**

Siglap Basketball Club emerged champion in the 2019 National Basketball League (NBL) Division I competition. Special recognition must go to ICBC Bank for their continuous support of our flagship tournaments in recent years. In the women's league- the WNBL 2019, Hillcrest Grays continued their dominance in the local scene with their sixth consecutive championship.

In the NBL Qualifying Round, BAS collaborated with ActiveSG for the tournament and a total of 38 teams took part in November 2019, with champions Nanyang and runners up Hoops Factory gaining promotion to the next NBL Division I season in 2020. BAS also continued the partnership with ActiveSG on the Masters', Development League for B and C Division school tournaments and the Pesta Sukan competitions, while BAS continued their long-time partnership with MILO Singapore to organize the boys & girls U16 and U18 categories.

#### **Coaching & Development**

The Coaching & Development (C&D) Committee has organised and conducted the SG-Coach Level One Basketball Coaching Course, with 28 participants passing the course. C&D further organised 4 more coaching clinics by instructors Xiangxi Gao and Bob Pierce, the coaches certainly benefited tremendously with the instructors' experience and credentials.

#### **Technical Committee**

Technical Committee kept their calendar busy with various technical officiating activities as well as growing its digital presence.

Singapore now has more than 248 registered Technical Officials (TO) which includes Technical Commissioners, Referees, Table Officials & Statisticians whom officiated actively in 2019. FIBA Referees represented Singapore to officiate at FIBA ASIA Champions Cup, South Asian Games, International Wheelchair Asia Oceania Championship and FIBA ASIA Cup 2021 Qualifiers Games as sanctioned by FIBA, FIBA Asia & SEABA.

BAS had also conducted several courses including the Mini Referee Course, Local Statistician Workshop and Gathering cum Dialogue Session and unfortunately due to the COVID-19 outbreak, several planned workshops such as the FIBA International Statistician Workshop and BAS Referee Course Level 2 scheduled in March 2020 were postponed.

#### **Sponsorships and Digital Media Presence**

I am pleased to share that two new sponsors joined the BAS family- Rigorer Singapore and The Sports & Physio Care Centre in May 2019, while Kin Teck Tong and Molten extended the agreement till 2021 and 2022 respectively. M&P definitely plays a key role in taking measures to increase public awareness in basketball with a significant attention to digital marketing.

#### MYSP 2018 - 2021

BAS will continue our commitment on the Multi Year Sports Plan (MYSP), more notable: enhancing our digital media presence and increase our sponsorships & donations, developing children's' interest, women's basketball and our pool of quality coaches and officials. On the international stage, we will focus on a High Performance Competition Plan in preparation for SEA Games 2021 as well as qualification for the 2021 SEA Games for the Women's 5v5, Men's 3x3 and Women's 3x3 teams.

#### Task Force Collaboration with FIBA & SportSG

In September 2019, BAS held a MYSP-Task Force Workshop in line with BAS's commitment on the development of basketball and subsequently, prepared a Task-Force report for submission to SportSG regarding BAS's recommendations and programmes.

BAS faced several challenges to the execution to the Task Force, which include funding as well as the need for an all-rounded sporting calendar. Many planned activities and programmes have been disrupted as well due to the on-going COVID-19 pandemic.

The Task-Force collaboration ultimately is for the future of basketball and I am fully confident that as long as BAS stay united and tackle each obstacle as a team, the future of Singapore basketball is bright.

#### **Amendment of BAS Constitution**

BAS amended its constitution at the 2018 Annual General Meeting and has published the amended BAS Constitution regarding Associate Membership and Entrance Fee for Ordinary Membership onto our website in line with the Societies Act.

#### Conclusion

Despite the numerous challenges ahead, our mission remains to raise our game of basketball to even higher standards. As the BAS Management Committee serves its second year of the current term, I look forward to the MC working closely together on a win-win collaboration with clubs and stakeholders to reciprocate from the unwavering support from our clubs, fans and partners.

Let's stay united and work together for the good of basketball!

#### 1 Welcome Address

Mr David Ong welcomed all members to the 2019 Basketball Association of Singapore (BAS) Annual General Meeting (AGM) and delivered his opening address.

#### 2 Confirmation of Minutes of 2018 Annual General Meeting

Mr Stephen Loo called for confirmation of the minutes of previous AGM. The minutes was proposed for confirmation by Mr Glen Chua, and seconded by Mr Tan Jong See.

#### 3 Treasurer Report

Mr Wayne Soo briefed members on the treasurer report for the last fiscal year. There were no issues arising from Kong, Lim and Partners audit report of BAS. Mr Wayne Soo directed members to page 7 of the statement of income and informed members that the drop in half a million in income is due to SportSG redirecting funds directly to Singapore Slingers, as well as other operating expenses. There is a surplus of \$162,000 for court rental compared to last financial year. For balance sheet, no major variations compared to last year.

#### 4 Appointment of External Auditor

Kong, Lim and Partners have several partners, and they have been servicing our association for the past 2 years. Mr Wayne Soo indicated that it is good practice to retain the auditor for 5 years, and he proposed to appoint Kong, Lim and Partners to continue as BAS external auditor for the next 3 years. Members have no objections to appoint Kong, Lim and Partners as external auditors for ensuing years.

#### 5 Confirmation of Annual Statement of Account

Mr Stephen Loo called for confirmation of the annual statement of account for the fiscal year ended March 2019. The statement was proposed by Mr Ethan Ong, and seconded by Mr Ong Swee Teck.

#### **6 Election of Management Committee Members**

Mr Koh Kah Tiong raised a question to Honorary Secretary on how many of 29 members are voting through a proxy and how many of them have not paid the annual subscription fee. Honorary Secretary Mr Stephen Loo replied that the members who are in the room today have fulfilled the conditions to vote and are eligible to do so. 21 out of 29 members present can vote at this AGM, with no proxies present.

Mr Ng Choon Hong raised the issue that the clubs only received the letter on Monday, 17 June and that there is not enough time to send in their nomination by the stipulated deadline. Mr David Ong replied that the procedures were adhered to and based on the constitution, BAS have fulfilled the period of notification. Mr Koh Kah Tiong then proposed to view all the signed nomination and election forms to show to all members present. Mr Ng Choon Hong raised the question of who personally submitted the nomination forms and who submitted using a proxy. Mr David Ong replied that as long as the form was signed off by the club president, it is considered official.

#### 8.1.2 Future Plans of BAS

Mr Koh Kah Tiong enquired on the future plans of BAS.

Mr David Ong responded to this question by urging the newly-elected MC members to look into it.

#### 8.1.3 Low Refereeing Standards

Mr Koh enquired on the steps BAS is taking to ensure a good level of refereeing standards in Singapore.

Mr David Ong responded to this question by stating that the overall referees' standard has been improving, and urged the newly-elected MC members to work closely with FIBA on further improving the refereeing standard in the country.

#### 8.1.4 Ordinary Members Entrance Fee

Mr Koh enquired on the high entry fee for being a BAS Ordinary Member. He stated that the current entry fee of \$5,000 will discourage many clubs from becoming members.

Mr David Ong responded to this question by stating that this entry fee was discussed and passed at the 2018 BAS AGM. Mr David Ong also urged the newly-elected MC members to look into the entry fee.

#### 8.1.5 Ordinary Members Representation

Mr Koh enquired on how the 5 elected members will represent all the 29 member clubs in the BAS MC.

Mr David Ong responded to this question by urging the newly-elected MC to engage in frequent dialogue with all clubs.

#### 8.2 Questions from Mr Ng Choon Hong

Refer to section 6 of this report for the questions by Mr Ng Choon Hong.

#### 8.3 Questions from Mr Ong Swee Teck

#### 8.3.1 BAS & Singapore Slingers Relationship

Mr Ong Swee Teck noted that during the FIBA Asia Cup 2021 Pre-Qualifiers Eastern Region held in November 2018, there were conflicting schedules between the Singapore Slingers and the national team qualifiers which resulted in players being unable to play for Singapore.

Mr David Ong replied that the Qualifiers were sudden, and there needs to be further dialogue between BAS and Singapore Slingers. Players will have the obligation towards their clubs and paymaster, and BAS has to think of a better way. Mr David Ong replied to Mr Kwang Hock Soon's query on the source of funding for Singapore Slingers. Mr David Ong replied that a big portion of their funding comes from their owner as well as gate tickets.

Mr David Ong informed members that BAS should let the clubs handle their own players, including the registration of players. This is also one of the reasons why BAS is doing away with the national players commitment letter for this year.

#### 2. Ordinary Membership

The number of BAS Ordinary Membership is 29 as at June 2020.

#### 3. <u>Disruptions due to the COVID-19 Pandemic</u>

As the world currently battles against the COVID-19 pandemic, the Singapore Government has also introduced a series of measures to contain the virus.

On our part, BAS has introduced several measures based on the advisories from the Ministry of Health, Singapore and SportSG to safeguard all athletes, staff and visitors' health and wellbeing. These measures have disrupted some of our activities unfortunately.

#### **Tournaments**

The U18 and U16 national championships have been postponed from June to December 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 situation. Other competitions affected are the Masters Tournament and possibly NBL Division I, WNBL and NBL Qualifying Round as BAS is currently looking to fit these competitions to the sporting calendar once the situation improves.

#### National Teams & International Competitions

- National team trainings and trials across all categories have been suspended.
- Affected International competitions: FIBA 3x3 Asia Cup and FIBA U18 Women's Asian Championship.

#### Coach Education

The coaching clinics with instructors Annie La Fleur and Rob McClanaghan supposed to be held in March and April respectively were cancelled as well. Bob Pierce coaching clinics that were held in March saw several restrictions being put in place, such as a maximum capacity of only 50 coaches and social distancing measures to contain the spread.

#### **Technical Officials Education**

The FIBA International Statistician Workshop and the BAS Referee Course Level 2 scheduled in March 2020 were also postponed. The workshops would be held later in 2020 with additional measures taken including safe distancing and temperature taking during the sessions.

#### Review of Court Hiring Fees

In order to increase the usage of courts at Singapore Basketball Centre, the court hiring fees were adjusted from January 2020 onwards, on the condition that it would be reviewed in six months' time.

Court bookings were cancelled from February to June 2020 due to the COVID-19 circuit breaker. With the cancellation of the National Schools Basketball competition and since the SBC is mainly used for BAS' own events from July to December 2020, BAS has decided that the review for the interim rates to be extended to 30 June 2021 in order to better gauge the effect of the new court hiring fees.

#### 4. Major Domestic Basketball Tournaments

In line with BAS's vision and mission to develop basketball as the team sport of choice, BAS organises major tournaments throughout the sports calendar year to promote basketball for all age categories. This provides good competitive game exposure to the teams, players, technical officials and also an avenue for enjoyment for the basketball fans.

The major basketball tournaments organised include:

- •ActiveSG-BAS National Masters Basketball Tournament 2019, held from 2 March to 31 March 2019. A total of 22 teams participated in the only 40-49 Years Category.
- •Women's National Basketball League 2019, held from 9 July to 25 August 2019. A total of 7 teams participated.
- •38<sup>th</sup> MILO Junior Basketball Championships, held from 10 June to 30 June 2019. A total of 49 teams competed across 4 Age Categories.
- •ICBC National Basketball League Division I 2019, held from 3 July to 25 August 2019 with 10 teams competing for the flagship tournament.
- •National Basketball League Qualifying Round 2019 held from 9 November to 15 December 2019 with 38 teams battling for the top 2 spots for promotion to Division I.

#### IBF Youth Leaders Cup

BAS continued its support of the FIBA-led IBF Youth Leaders Cup in July 2019. Ms Amanda Lim from the women's national team was chosen by IBF to attend the 2019 program.

#### 5. National Teams in Major International Tournaments

#### 30th SEA Games - Men's National Team

The 30<sup>th</sup> Southeast Asian Games was held in the Philippines from 30 November 2019 to 11 December 2019. The Men's National Team participated in the 5-on-5 event held from 4 December to 10 December 2019 and finished 5<sup>th</sup> place out of 8 teams.

The team held training sessions and camps locally and overseas with a particular session attended by Senior Minister of State Ms Sim Ann in OCBC Arena on 5 November 2019 to cheer the team leading to the Games. The team also held training camps in Xi'An, China and Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam in the months leading to the Games and also hosted friendly matches against Maldives, Bangladesh and Hong Kong during their training tours to Singapore and forged good relationships.

The team had gained valuable competition exposure and experience. BAS and Singapore Slingers will continue working closely together for the development of the men's national team.

#### 6. Coaching & Development

#### SG-Coach Level One Integrated Course (Basketball)

The Coaching & Development (C&D) Committee organised the level one coaching course, with 28 participants passing the course held from November 2019 to January 2020.

C&D organised 4 coaching clinics by instructors Xiangxi Gao and Bob Pierce. Due to COVID-19 pandemic, BAS limited the total number of attendees to 50 coaches for the Bob Pierce clinics.

C&D also collaborated with NYSI to organise clinics for our national youth coaches to better equip them to help our national youth athletes.

#### 2019 SBP Coaches' Summit - Manila, Philippines

FIBA hosted a coaching clinic in Manila, Philippines from 20-21 July 2019 and invited all Southeast Asian national federations to nominate one male and one female coach to attend the seminar.

Mr Sng Seg Mong Adrian (Head Coach, U16 Women's) and Ms Hannah Ho Yoke Mei (Assistant Coach, Senior Women's) were shortlisted to represent Singapore to attend the clinic.

#### 7. Technical Committee

The Technical Committee (TC) continued to carry out various technical officiating activities to keep the calendar vibrant and exciting and simultaneously launched its digital media presence to cater to its growing technical presence.

Singapore now has 2 Technical Commissioners, 4 FIBA Referees, 28 FIBA Licensed table Officials, 11 FIBA Licensed Statisticians and 2 International 3x3 Referees. FIBA Referees represented Singapore to officiate at FIBA ASIA Champions Cup, South Asian Games, International Wheelchair Asia Oceania Championship and FIBA ASIA Cup 2021 Qualifiers Games.

BAS had also conducted 1 Mini Referee Course, 1 Local Statistician Workshop and 1 Gathering cum Dialogue Session in the past year.

In line with FIBA guidelines, the Referee courses would be renamed in ascending order from Level 0 to Level 3. In addition, 3x3 and Table Officials courses would be introduced as well.

#### 8. Marketing & Publicity

#### The Straits Times Interview with President

The Straits Times conducted an interview with President BAS Mr Hoo Boon Hock on 21 February 2020. Mr Hoo shared some of his thoughts and plans for BAS and basketball. The article was published on *The Sunday Times* on 8 March 2020 and was shared via our digital platforms.

#### Media-BAS Networking Lunch

BAS held a media networking lunch on 12 November 2019 with major local media representatives with the purpose of connecting with our partners as well as keeping media informed of BAS upcoming plans.

#### FIBA Asia Online Photography Workshop

FIBA Asia organised an online photography workshop for interested photographers to develop their photography skills. The first workshop was held on 7 May 2020, via video conferencing. FIBA Asia has indicated that more coming workshops would be planned. A total of 9 participants from Singapore took part in the online workshop.

#### Summary of Engagement for Digital Media

Today, digital media continue to be important drivers in line with BAS's vision to develop basketball as the team sport of choice.

BAS continues to improve on our digital media platforms including our official website and social media for better engagement and viewership.

#### Sponsorships & Revenue Streams

BAS had worked hard to grow its revenue streams and ensure NSA sustainability in line with the MYSP. More than \$350,800 in cash & product-in-kind have been obtained for the Financial Year.

In addition, CEO of BAS had brought in \$70,000 of cash donations from the "Friends of Basketball" captained by Mr Mark Lee, CEO of Sing Lun Holdings. With the One Team Singapore Fund (OTSF) matching grant, BAS would have a total of \$140,000 earmarked for high performance.

BAS would continue to take advantage of the immerse potential of digital marketing and collaborations such as live streaming to help achieve NSA sustainability.

#### 9. FIBA Asia Permanent Committees & FIBA Technical Commission 2019-2023

I am delighted to share that both TC Chairman Mr Ong Peng Kiat and I have been appointed to the FIBA Asia Permanent Committees for the Term of Office 2019-2023. Mr Ong is appointed to the Youth Committee (South East) while I am appointed as a member to the Development Committee (South East). The FIBA Asia Permanent Committee consists of 11 Sub-Committees with representatives from different sub-zones (Asia Region) and different countries in Asia aiming to develop basketball in Asia.

In addition, I have also been appointed to the FIBA Technical Commission for the Term of Office 2019-2023, with the main functions include the development of the sport globally, reviewing the Official Basketball Rules as well as responsible for the training & development of FIBA international officials.

Together with experienced personnel representing Singapore working alongside with the experts and professionals from around the world contributing to the development of basketball, I am confident that the future of basketball is in safe hands!

#### 10. Secretariat Updates

With Dr Toh Kian Lam's secondment from Singapore National Olympic Council (SNOC) to BAS on the 1<sup>st</sup> of October 2019 as the CEO of BAS, BAS currently has a healthy strength of 6 full-time Secretariat staff, 1 part-time staff and 1 general worker overseeing the cleaning and maintenance of the Singapore Basketball Centre (SBC), BAS' current and only office.

The Management Committee and Secretariat staff would continue to work closely together as one unit to ensure the Association functions seamlessly as well as complies fully with governance procedures in line with the audit requirements.

#### 11. BAS Chinese New Year (CNY) Appreciation Dinner 2020

BAS hosted its annual CNY Appreciation Dinner to thank all stakeholders for the enormous support and contributions toward the sport of basketball. The Dinner was held on Friday, 7 February 2020, at Jubilee Gardens (Qian Xi Group Restaurant).

President Mr Hoo Boon Hock graced the occasion as the Guest-of-Honour with close to 120 guests including current & ex MC Members, Valued Partners, Sponsors, Club Representatives, National Teams Players and Coaches attended the Dinner to welcome the year of Rat.

#### 12. Concluding Remarks

I am pleased to note that there is excellent work done for the past year, from increasing participation and engagement rate for BAS tournaments and courses, the support given and provided to the coaches and officials, to achieving NSA sustainability.

BAS will continue to make improvements under its ecosystem and review its operating practices to constantly improve ourselves and the sport of basketball.

I would like to express my heartfelt thanks to all MC members, sub-committees and of course, the Secretariat staff for their commendable efforts and contributions toward the sport of basketball given the current challenges faced in this term. 

Marketing & Publicity Committee plays a key role in taking measure to increase public awareness in basketball with a significant attention to digital marketing, as well as increasing the sustainability of the Association through obtaining sponsorship revenue streams.



#### 2. Publicity: Digital Media & Live Broadcasting

Marketing & Publicity Committee have always been exploring and fine-tuning its publicity plans in line with its digital marketing strategies. The emphasis is to regularly publish quality content to reach out to the wider public.

To ensure greater accessibility and relevancy, M&P have been actively working with our providers to regularly updating BAS website user-interface through 'add-ons'. One such significant add-on includes an "E-Donate" tab on the website for easy access from public donations.

M&P Committee also collaborate with third parties such as Genius Sports and 1 Play Sports for Game-Day live user-friendly statistics and live streaming of games such as the 2019 ICBC NBL & WNBL flagship tournaments. M&P also keep fans regularly updated on major tournaments such as the 2019 SEA Games on our digital platforms, allowing basketball fans to enjoy closer top-tier basketball action.




Figure 1: TC Organization Chart, extracted 1st TC meeting held on 31 August 2019




Figure 3: Infographics, extracted MYSP presentation by TC held on 9 Sep 2019

#### 2.4 Operations Improvement

We have automated the following manual process and brought them online for easy access.

- i. Registration of Local Technical Officials and 2 rounds of registrar verification.
- ii. Registration of courses and online payment
- iii. Request for Officiating Services
- iv. Evaluation of Class A and B officials
  - a. Videos are uploaded online for Evaluators to access at their own convenience and evaluation forms are made available online with appropriate access rights.

#### 3. Development of Technical Officials

#### 3.1 FIBA Development Programmes

#### 3.1.1 FIBA Table Officials Programme (FITOP)

There were 30 candidates identified to participate in FITOP. This is an online programme organised by FIBA. There were 28 candidates who were successful in obtaining the FITOP license, which qualifies the holder to table officiate FIBA associated international games. The licence is valid until 31 Aug 2021.

#### 3.1.2 FIBA Statisticians Workshop (Postponed due to CoVid-19)

This workshop is a license renewal for FIBA statisticians. Due to FIBA travel restrictions amidst the CoVid-19 pandemic, the FIBA Statistician Workshop has been postponed until further notice.

#### 3.1.3 FIBA Asia Referee Clinic (Postponed due to CoVid-19)

This clinic provides a platform for local active FIBA referees to be nominated to govern sub-zone or FIBA Asia and/ or international games as FIBA officials. The active FIBA referees need to participate and pass the stipulated tests in the clinic held in Singapore in order to be nominated. Due to FIBA travel restrictions amidst the CoVid-19 pandemic, the FIBA Asia Referee Clinic has been postponed until further notice.

#### 3.2 <u>Local Development Programmes</u>

#### 3.2.1 Technical Officials Pathway

The TO development pathways were set up in alignment with FIBA directives and is published on the Technical Officials website <a href="https://www.bas-officials.org/library/officials-pathway">https://www.bas-officials.org/library/officials-pathway</a>




Figure 5: Technical Officials Pathway (Referees), extracted https://www.bas-officials.org/library/officials-pathway




Figure 6: Technical Officials Pathway (Table Officials and Statisticians), extracted https://www.bas-officials.org/library/officials-pathway

#### 3.2.2 Referee Course Level 1 (Bukit Batok Secondary School)

Bukit Batok Secondary School is the first organization to receive the Level 1 Referee education after BAS curriculum / pathway alignment with FIBA. The course was held in Bukit Batok Secondary School on 3rd and 4th June 2019. 31 participants have gone through the course and are eligible to officiate inter- primary school games, if they so choose to register with the Technical Committee.

#### 3.2.3 Statistician Workshop

This trial statistician workshop was held in Singapore Basketball Centre on the 21st November 2019. 10 participants have gone through the workshop. Special appreciation to Mr. Paul Ng and Mr. Ong Jin Leong for holding this workshop on a pro-bono basis. The Technical Committee will put more emphasis on statisticians due to a lack of manpower to support FIBA's initiatives and directive on the National Federation on this area.

#### 3.2.4 Refresher & Gathering & Dialogue Session

A quick refresher to the FIBA rules as well as a Chinese New Year gathering and dialogue session was organised on the 8 February 2020. There were 35 participants in the great dialogue session which discussed the Strength, Weakness, Opportunities and Threats of our technical community and how we can achieve greater heights in the future.

#### 3.2.5 Referee Course Level 2 (Postponed due to CoVid-19)

On the onset of the CoVid-19 situation, the Technical Committee has put in a Business Continuity Plan (BCP) as well as risk assessment together with the safety measures to be taken should the approved course still be conducted. However, the course is put on hold with respect to BAS President and Honorary Secretary's advice. The concerns of the postponement have been addressed in the TC report for 6th Management Committee Meeting 2019/2021.

#### 3.2.6 Officials Licensing Programme 2020 (Work In Progress)

As part of improving the quality standards and alignment of judgement calls efforts, a series of activities are to be lined up for proposal to the Management Committee. Trials for such activities are in progress to ensure that these long term activities are workable and sustainable.

Example 1: Video Evaluation trials has also been completed for:

- i) Class A TOs in WNBL, NBL 2019
- ii) Class B TOs in SUNIG 2019
- iii) Class C TOs (OJT Video Evaluation)

These data will be considered during the Official Licensing Programme for TOs categorization

Example 2: Online classroom setup have been tried out with Bukit Batok Secondary School as a service recovery to the Referee Course Level 1. Further tests were supposed to be conducted with Referee Course Level 2 which was postponed. The Technical Committee will propose the execution of the Officiating Licensing Programme once the trials are completed.

# 1. General

Basketball Association of Singapore (the "Association") is an Association registered in Singapore under Societies Act, Cap. 311. It was granted the status of an Institutions of a Public Character under the Charities Act, Chapter 37 from 8 April 2017 to 7 April 2020, subject to renewal.

The principal activities of the Association are those of promoting, enhancing and developing basketball activities.

The registered office is located at 601 Aljunied Avenue 1, #01-04 Singapore Basketball Centre, Singapore 389862.

#### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies

# 2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Association have been drawn up in accordance with the Charities Act, Cap. 37, Societies Act, Cap. 311, and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS"). The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention except where a financing reporting standard requires an alternative treatment (such as fair values) as disclosed where appropriate in these financial statements.

The financial statements are presented in Singapore Dollar (S\$), which is the Association's functional currency.

#### 2.2 Adoption of new and amended standards and interpretations

The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year except in the current financial year, the Association has adopted all the new and amended standards which are relevant to the Association and are effective for annual financial periods beginning on or after 1 April 2019. Except for the adoption of FRS 116 Leases described below, the adoption of these standards did not have any material effect on the financial performance or position of the Association.

#### FRS 116 Leases

FRS 116 supersedes FRS 17 Leases, INT FRS 104 Determining whether an Arrangement contains a Lease, INT FRS 15 Operating Leases-Incentives and INT FRS 27 Evaluating the Substance of Transactions Involving the Legal Form of a Lease. The standard sets out the principles for the recognition, measurement, presentation and disclosure of leases and requires lessees to recognise most leases on the statement of financial position.

# 2.2 Adoption of new and amended standards and interpretations (continued)

#### FRS 116 Leases (continued)

The Association has lease contract for office equipment. Before the adoption of FRS 116, the Association classified each of its leases (as lessee) at the inception date as either a finance lease or an operating lease. The accounting policy prior to 1 April 2019 is disclosed in Note 2.13.

Upon adoption of FRS 116, the Association applied a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases except for leases of low-value assets. The accounting policy beginning on and after 1 April 2019 as disclosed in Note 2.13. The standard provides specific transition requirements and practical expedients, which have been applied by the Association.

# Leases previously accounted for as operating leases

The Association recognised right-of-use assets and lease liabilities for those leases previously classified as operating leases, except for leases of low-value assets. The right-of-use assets for the leases were recognised based on the carrying amount as if the standard had always been applied, using the incremental borrowing rate at the date of initial application. Lease liabilities were recognised based on the present value of the remaining lease payments, discounted using the incremental borrowing rate at the date of initial application.

The Association also applied the available practical expedients wherein it:

- used a single discount rate to a portfolio of leases with reasonably similar characteristics;
- relied on its assessment of whether leases are onerous immediately before the date of initial application as an alternative to performing an impairment review;
- applied the short-term leases exemption to leases with lease term that ends within 12 months of the date of initial application;
- excluded the initial direct costs from the measurement of the right-of-use asset at the date
  of initial application; and
- used hindsight in determining the lease term where the contract contained options to extend or terminate the lease.

As at 1 April 2019, the Association only has lease of low-value asset.

The Association has not adopted the following standards applicable to the Association that have been issued but not yet effective:

#### 2.4 Property, plant and equipment

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. Subsequent to recognition, property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. The cost of property, plant and equipment includes its purchase price and any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method to allocate depreciable amounts over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

The carrying values of property, plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

The useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss on derecognition of the asset is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

#### 2.5 Impairment of non-financial assets

The Association assesses at each reporting date whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired. If any indication exists, or when an annual impairment testing for an asset is required, the Association makes an estimate of the asset's recoverable amount.

An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's or cash-generating unit's fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use and is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or group of assets. Where the carrying amount of an asset or cash-generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount.

Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss.

A previously recognised impairment loss is reversed only if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the asset's recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. If that is the case, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to its recoverable amount. That increase cannot exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, had no impairment loss been recognised previously. Such reversal is recognised in profit or loss.

#### 2.6 Financial instruments

#### (a) Financial assets

#### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are recognised when, and only when the entity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

At initial recognition, the Association measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at FVPL, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at FVPL are expensed in profit or loss.

Trade and other receivables are measured at the amount of consideration to which the Association expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third party, if the trade and other receivables do not contain a significant financing component at initial recognition.

#### Subsequent measurement

Financial assets at amortised cost

A financial asset is subsequently measured at amortised cost if the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the financial asset at amortised cost are measured using the effective interest method and is subject to impairment. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised, modified or impaired.

#### Derecognition

A financial asset is derecognised where the contractual right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired. On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and any cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income for debt instruments is recognised in profit or loss.

# (b) Financial liabilities

# Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are recognised when, and only when, the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. The Association determines the classification of its financial liabilities at initial recognition.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value plus in the case of financial liabilities not at FVPL, directly attributable transaction costs.

#### Subsequent measurement

After initial recognition, financial liabilities that are not carried at FVPL are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortisation process.

#### Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged, cancelled or expires. On derecognition, the difference between the carrying amounts and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

#### 2.7 Impairment of financial assets

The Association recognises an allowance for expected credit losses (ECLs) for all debt instruments not held at FVPL. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Association expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12-months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is recognised for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

For trade receivables, the Association applies a simplified approach in calculating ECLs. Therefore, the Association does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date. The Association has established a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment which could affect debtors' ability to pay.

The Association considers a financial asset in default when internal or external information indicates that the Association is unlikely to receive the outstanding contractual amounts in full before taking into account any credit enhancements held by the Association. A financial asset is written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the contractual cash flows.

# 2.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, cash at bank and short-term deposits and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

#### 2.9 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and the amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. If it is no longer probable that an outflow of economic resources will be required to settle the obligation, the provision is reversed. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, where appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.

#### 2.10 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured based on the consideration to which the Association expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a member, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third parties.

Revenue is recognised when the Association satisfies a performance obligation by transferring a promised good or service to the member, which is when the member obtains control of the good or service. A performance obligation may be satisfied at a point in time or over time. The amount of revenue recognised is the amount allocated to the satisfied performance obligation.

# (i) Subscription fee

The Association generates income from collecting members' subscriptions. These payments allow the members to continue enjoy the benefits as a member of the Association. Payment of subscription fees is made by members once the invoice issued.

# (ii) Rental income

The Association generates rental income from court booking fee. Rental income is recognised once the receipts issued to the members.

# (iii) Government grant

Government grants are recognised at fair value when there is reasonable assurance that the conditions attaching to them will be complied with and that the grants will be received. Grants in recognition of specific expenses are recognised in profit or loss on a systematic basis the periods necessary to match them with the related costs that they are intended to compensate.

# (iv) Donations and sponsorships

Income from donations and sponsorships are recognised at point in time when the Association received donations and sponsorships from members.

#### (v) Course registration fee

The Association generates income from collecting course registration fees. These payments allow the members to enjoy the benefits from training course. Revenue is recognised at point in time once the receipts issued to members.

# 2.11 Gift in kind

A gift in kind (if any) is included in the statement of financial activities based on an estimate of the fair value at the date of the receipt of the gift of the non-monetary asset or the grant of a right to the monetary asset. The gift is recognised if the amount of the gift can be measured reliably and there is no uncertainty that it will be received. No value is ascribed to volunteer services.

#### 2.12 Employee benefits

#### Defined contribution plans

The Association makes contributions to the Central Provident Fund scheme in Singapore, a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions to defined contribution pension schemes are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is performed.

#### 2.13 Leases

The Association assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

#### As lessee

The Association applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for leases of low-value assets.

#### Leases of low-value assets

The Association applies the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to lease of office equipment that is considered to be low value. Lease payments on lease of low value asset is recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

#### 2.14 Taxes

The Association is a tax-exempted institution under Section 13(1)(zm) of the Income Tax Act, Chapter 134.

# 2.15 Conflict of interest policy

Management Committee (the "MC") members are expected to avoid actual and perceived conflicts of interest. Where MC members have personal interest in business transactions or contracts that the Association may enter into, or have vested interest in other organisations that the Association have dealings with or is considering to enter into joint ventures with, they are expected to declare such interests to the MC as soon as possible and abstain from discussion and decision-making on the matter. Where such conflicts exist, the MC will evaluate whether any potential conflicts of interest will affect the continuing independence of MC members and whether it is appropriate for the MC member to continue to remain on the MC.

# 2.16 Funds

Fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes if any by action of the committee members. Externally restricted funds may only be utilised in accordance with the purpose established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with the unrestricted funds over which the committee members retain full control of use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

# 3. Significant accounting judgments and estimates

The preparation of the Association's financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of income, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the end of each reporting period. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in the future periods.

# 3.1 Judgments made in applying accounting policies

The management committee members are of the opinion that there are no significant judgments made in applying accounting estimates and policies that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

# 3.2 Key sources of estimation of uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period are discussed below. The Association based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the Association. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

# Useful lives of property, plant and equipment

The useful life of an item of property, plant and equipment is estimated at the time the asset is acquired and is based on historical experience with similar assets and takes into account anticipated technological or other changes. If changes occur more rapidly than anticipated or the asset experiences unexpected level of wear and tear, the useful life will be adjusted accordingly. The carrying amount of the Association's property, plant and equipment as at 31 March 2020 was \$\$41,830 (2019: \$\$117,344).

# 20. Financial risk management

The Association's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks from its operation. The key financial risks include credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Management Committee Members review and agree policies and procedures for the management of these risks, which are executed by the management team. It is, and has been throughout the current and previous financial year, the Association's policy that no trading in derivatives for speculative purposes shall be undertaken.

The following sections provide details regarding the Association's exposure to the abovementioned financial risks and the objectives, policies and processes for the management of these risks.

There has been no change to the Association's exposure to these financial risks or the manner in which it manages and measures the risks.

#### Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that the counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in a loss to the Association. The Association's exposure to credit risk arises primarily from trade and other receivables. For other financial assets, the Association minimises credit risk by dealing exclusively with high credit rating counterparties.

# 20. Financial risk management (continued)

# Credit risk (continued)

The Association has adopted a policy of only dealing with creditworthy counterparties. The Association performs ongoing credit evaluation of its counterparties' financial condition and generally do not require a collateral.

The Association considers the probability of default upon initial recognition of asset and whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk on an ongoing basis throughout each reporting period.

The Association has determined the default event on a financial asset to be when internal and/or external information indicates that the financial asset is unlikely to be received, which could include default of contractual payments due for more than 90 days or there is significant difficulty of the counterparty.

To minimise credit risk, the Association has developed and maintained the Association's credit risk gradings to categorise exposures according to their degree of risk of default. The credit rating information is supplied by publicly available financial information and the Association's own trading records to rate its major customers and other debtors. The Association considers available reasonable and supportive forward-looking information which includes the following indicators:

- Actual or expected significant adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant change to the debtor's ability to meet its obligations
- Actual or expected significant changes in the operating results of the debtor
- Significant increases in credit risk on other financial instruments of the same debtor
- Significant changes in the expected performance and behaviour of the debtor, including changes in the payment status of debtors in the group and changes in the operating results of the debtor.

Regardless of the analysis above, a significant increase in credit risk is presumed if a debtor is more than 30 days past due in making contractual payment.

The Association determined that its financial assets are credit-impaired when:

- There is significant difficulty of the debtor
- A breach of contract, such as a default or past due event
- It is becoming probable that the debtor will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation
- There is a disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulty

The Association categorises a receivable for potential write-off when a debtor fails to make contractual payments more than 30 days past due. Financial assets are written off when there is evidence indicating that the debtor is in severe financial difficulty and the debtor has no realistic prospect of recovery.

# Trade receivables

As at 31 March 2020, the Association recorded trade receivables of S\$35,020 (2019: S\$36,230). The Association assessed the impairment loss allowance of these amounts on a 12-month ECL basis consequent to their assessment and conclusion that these receivables are of low credit risk. Using 12-month ECL, the Association determined that the ECL is insignificant.

# Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk refers to the risk that the Association will encounter difficulties in meeting its short-term obligations due to shortage of funds. The Association's exposure to liquidity risk arises primarily from mismatches of the maturities of financial assets and liabilities. It is managed by matching the payment and receipt cycles. The Association's objective is to maintain a balance between operational cash requirements and cash in hand. The Association's operations are financed mainly through annual grant from Sport SG and court rental income. The management committee members are satisfied that funds are available to finance the operations of the Association.

The reserves that the Association have set aside provide financial stability and the means for the development of the principal activities. The Association intends to maintain the fund at a level which is at least equivalent to 3 months of operating expenses of approximately \$\$250,000. The funds are meant to provide a cushion to ease the operational cash flow requirements while pending funding from SSC.

The Management Committee reviews annually the amount of funds that are required to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil the Association's continuing obligations.

The Association is not subject to externally imposed capital requirements.

The building fund was set up for the Association's leasehold improvements. This is amortised according to the useful life of leasehold improvements. During the year, the amortisation of the building fund amounted to S\$63,830 (2019: S\$63,830) (Note 8).

#### 22. Fair values

The fair value of a financial instrument is the amount at which the instrument could be exchanged or settled between knowledgeable and willing parties in an arm's length transaction.

The following methods and assumptions are used to estimate the fair value of each class of financial instruments for which it is practicable to estimate that value.

Cash and cash equivalents, fixed deposit, other receivables and other payables

The carrying amounts of these balances approximate their fair values due to the short-term nature of these balances.

Trade receivables

The carrying amounts of these receivables approximate their fair values as they are subject to normal trade credit terms.

#### 25. Subsequent event

As disclosed in the President's Message included in our Annual Report, the Association expects a slowdown in our activities resulting from the impact of the COVID-19 outbreak as we are not yet allowed to rent out our sports facilities nor organize large-scale domestic and international sports activities and tournaments whereby safe-distancing will be difficult to manage. Our Association will continue to closely monitor the impact of the outbreak and follow all guidelines prescribed by the authorities. As the situation is still evolving, the full financial effects of the outbreak for the financial year 31 March 2020 is unable to be estimated at the date of authorisation of these financial statements.
